Key Stage 3

The Key Stage 3 English course at Futures Community College gives students the ability and enthusiasm to develop essential skills in reading, writing and spoken English. Students learn to express themselves creatively and to communicate with confidence and flair. The course enables students to develop an appreciation and love of reading; exposing them to increasingly challenging material through a wide range of fiction and non-fiction texts.

Key Stage 3 English covers the study of poetry, prose fiction and drama, including Shakespeare. Students consolidate and build on their knowledge of grammar and vocabulary through a range of challenging texts. Students will have the opportunity to:

- Plan, draft, edit and present original written work
- Imagine, explore, analyse and entertain through the study of literature
- Inform, explain and describe in fiction and non-fiction writing
- Persuade, argue and advice in written work and discussions
- Analyse, review and comment effectively on author's craft.

Key Stage 4

This subject is designed to enable students to reach their full potential in English and achieve the highest possible grades in external examinations; to develop the ability of all students to communicate effectively both in writing and orally in a wide range of contexts and situations and to enable students to use accurate Standard English with confidence and fluency.

We aim to develop an interest in the richness of the English language in its various forms and its historical development, and to give students' experience of a wide range of literature and encourage them to become independent readers with enthusiasm for and curiosity about books. We endeavor to develop students' thirst for knowledge of our literary heritage.

Course Content

Amongst other topics students study the following:

- Shakespeare;
- Literary heritage texts both prose and poetry;
- Modern drama;
- Media and non-fiction analysis;

Syllabus Details

Assessment

Assessment is through terminal examinations. Students will be guided and supported towards their target grades by teacher marking and feedback. Students use stimulus material provided by teachers and prescribed by the exam board to respond to reading, writing, and speaking and listening tasks. The materials studied are diverse and varied from literary heritage texts to contemporary works. Students study both fiction and non-fiction texts.

Requirements

This is a compulsory subject at Key Stage 3 and 4 followed by all students in the School.

SMSC

We teach modern British values through the reading of: DNA and the discussion of morality alongside, and as part of, our study of the text; A Christmas Carol and the discussion of inequality and poverty within society and; the many different relationships within our society, and our ability to accept and understand them, in our study of the Love and Relationships Cluster in the AQA Poetry Anthology. In addition, our study of non-fiction texts in Year 11 add to students' understanding of the world and the place of Great Britain, within it.
